Erasmus+ International Mobility for higher education students and staff

- Introduced in 2015 = academic year 2015/16
- Credit mobility for higher education students and staff from partner to programme countries and vice versa
- On a bilateral basis between institutions and not within a defined partnership
- Mobility settings similar to the "regular" Erasmus programme within European programme countries
- Available budget foresees fixed amounts for certain regions and country groups
- Decentralised action administrated by national agencies





Erasmus+ International **Mobility opportunities for students**

- Study stays
 - 3 months minimum and 12 months maximum duration
- Currently no funding opportunities for traineeships
 - Planned to be introduced in the near future
- Individual support and travel grant
 - Outgoing students from Austria: 650 Euro per month
 - Incoming students to Austria: 850 Euro per month
 - Travel grant calculation based on distance between sending and receiving institution ("distance band")
 - > Distance band between Austria and Israel provides 360 Euro per participant





Erasmus+ International Mobility opportunities for higher education staff

- Staff mobility for teaching/training
 - 5 days minimum and 2 months maximum duration
 - Mobilities that do not contain teaching or training character (e. g. preparatory visits) not eligible for funding
- Individual support and travel grant
 - Outgoing staff from Austria: 160 Euro per day
 - Incoming staff to Austria: 140 Euro per day
 - Travel grant calculation based on distance between sending and receiving institution ("distance band")
 - > Distance band between Austria and Israel provides 360 Euro per participant




Erasmus+ international **Budget structure**



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Erasmus+ International Credit Mobility Total Budget Call 2016: 135,7 Mio. Euro

- Austria's share: 2,8 Mio. Euro (= 2,01 %)
- Budget split into five financial instruments and 11 budget envelopes
- Budget distribution focusses the European Union's foreign policy priority regions

- Budget envelope without specifications:
 - All type of mobility flows (staff, students all cycles) are allowed in both directions can be organized
 - No presettings regarding the budget distribution among the countries contained in the envelope

Erasmus+ International Application process



- Applications for funding to be submitted exclusively by higher education institutions from programme countries
- Possibility to cooperate with several institutions from the same partner country within one project
- Annual call for applications: next deadline February 2017
 - No 2nd round of applications from 2017 on!
- Before submission: completion of letter of intent
- After project approval: signing of bilateral agreement



Erasmus+ International Application process



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Quality assessment

- Quality assessment of applications decides about eligibility for funding
- Assessment and budget distribution done by national agencies
- Argumentative text split up into 4 categories in which the applicant explains the planned mobility cooperation
- Partner country's institution's perspective is important as well!
 - Need for intense exchange of ideas between institutions beforehand
- Total score of 60 out of 100 points per partner country necessary to be considered for funding





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Application process: what to keep in mind

- Focus the facts that make your project unique and special, avoid being too generic
- Elaborate why the planned mobilities are important for both institutions involved
- Make use of existing cooperations and networks
- Think about complementarity: Ongoing CBHE project why not add KA 107 mobility exchange?
- Consider staff exchange as a trailblazer for further and more intense cooperation
 - Staff exchange takes up less budget than student mobility > therefore better chances to receive funding







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KA 107 projects between Austrian and Israeli HEIs

- Call 2015 (both rounds): 6 projects (total grant amount EUR 226.000)
- Call 2016 (1st round): 3 projects (total grant amount EUR 215.000)
- Call 2016 (2nd round): 4 applications (total requested grant EUR 110.000)
 - Deadline for 2nd round Call 2016 was September 15th > quality assessment and selection process to be completed





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
